

IN MEMORIAM


Bill Welsh


Jeffrey Warren Burstein died February 14, 2016 in Sun City Center FL. He was 69. A veteran of the [Vietnam War](#), he served in the [United States Marine Corps](#) from February 1964 to February 1969. Mr. Burstein is survived by his son Maxwell Sebastian, his two brothers, Nissen and Lee Burstein, and numerous nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents.

Mr. Burstein was born June 27, 1946 in Philadelphia, PA to his parents Charles and Geraldine Burstein. He graduated from Germantown High in 1963. In 1964, he joined the armed forces. He served overseas for two tours in Vietnam. He was honorably discharged in 1969. Following his military service he traveled extensively and worked for many years as a general contractor. Mr. Burstein was known for his gregarious nature, and abilities as a raconteur. A few short paragraphs are insufficient to communicate the loss of this singular individual, but know this, the world is much worse off without him.

Black, now at attention, answered, "Sir, 'Turd' is the acronym that stands for Trainee Undergoing Rigid Discipline." A moment of silence ... then the General cracked a smile and ordered, "Very well, carry on." He then strolled off to another area.

Marine Corps Museum Expansion Rolls On David H. Hugel

If you haven't visited the National Museum of the Marine Corps lately, you're in for a treat the next time you do. In early April, two new aviation exhibits went on public display in the museum's glass atrium known as Leatherneck Gallery. A UH-34D Sikorsky helicopter that saw extensive combat action in Vietnam and a restored SBD Dauntless dive bomber, flown by Marines during WWII will command visitor's attention.

In pervious issues of The Scoop Sheet, I have written about the restoration of the UH-34D helicopter with YN-19 markings, and it's donation to the NMMC by the Marines Helicopter Squadron 361 Veterans Association. One of the articles included an artist's rendering of how the helicopter would be displayed when the exhibit was scheduled to open during the early spring of 2016. The long wait is finally over, and visitors to the museum can now see the helicopter. As you look at the photos accompanying this article, that I recently took of the aircraft, you will notice that that the helicopter is missing its main and tail rotors. A sign posted at the exhibit explains why. The rotors could not be installed because of continuing construction activities related to the museum's expansion on the other side of the false wall behind the exhibit. They will be added as soon as that construction work is completed, and wall is removed.

The Douglas SBD-3 dive bomber recently added to the museum's aviation exhibits has been called the finest Marine dive-bomber of WWII. The aircraft was acquired by the museum in 2005 and is documented to have served with several Marine Corps aviation units during WWII, but never flew any combat missions. Restoration of the aircraft that began in 2009 required more than 65,000 hours, according to the museum's aviation curator Ben Kristy, who added that the effort required the replacement of 8,000 rivets on the center section of the fuselage alone. The Dauntless is displayed suspended from the atrium in a simulated bombing run.

Another new feature museum visitor encounter find is the Timothy T. Day Overlook in Semper Fidelis Memorial Park, adjacent to the museum. It was built with a generous donation from former Marine, Timothy T. Day, who founded Bar-S Foods. The overlook, dedicated last year, offers visitors a scenic vista along the park's memorial lined paths.

The expansion of the NMMC is a multi year project. According to a recent MCHF news release, in 2017 a two-story, giant-screen theater with a 350-seat capacity will open that will feature a film about the celebrated history of the Marine Corps with a focus on the modern day Marine. The following year, a gallery depicting Marine Corps service in regional conflicts and in humanitarian relief missions after the Vietnam War, including those in Beirut, Grenada and the Persian Gulf, will open to visitors. The Global War on Terror gallery will open at the same time, telling the latest chapter of Marine Corps history following the attacks of September 11, 2001. These two galleries will feature an impressive collection of large artifacts.

1st MAW member Dave Hugel Appears in Maryland Public Television Vietnam War Documentary

In November 2014, Maryland's Public Television station (MPT) launched an ambitious project to document the experiences of Marylanders who served during the Vietnam War. In the first phase of the project, MPT identified Maryland Vietnam veterans and conducted listening sessions around the state where executive producer Ken Day heard the stories of more than 300. From this group, Day selected nearly 100 veterans, representing all branches of the armed forces from the war's earliest years through its final days, to interview on videotape for the documentary.

Dave Hugel, who lives near Annapolis, Maryland, was selected to talk about his experiences during the war's early days. Dave served in Vietnam as a photographer for nine months during 1963- 1964 covering early Marine Corps helicopter operations in I Corps supporting America's Vietnamese allies, for which Commandant Wallace M. Greene, Jr. personally recognized his contribution to preserving the history of that period. Another 1st MAW Marine appearing in the documentary is Wayne "Mac"McNeir, who lives in Anne Arundel County, Maryland served with MABS-16 at the Da Nang airbase base during SHUFLY Operations in 1963.

Maryland Public Television (MPT) airs the film, Maryland Vietnam War Stories, on May 24, 25 and 26 at 8 pm (EDT). Thereafter, it may air in local markets across the country under the name American War Stories: Vietnam. To learn if the documentary is playing in your locale, check your local TV listings or call your local public TV station. (Public TV stations may use the film immediately or possibly show it in the coming months or around Veterans Day.)


